I don't think the original PPP implants were ever wound into a ball. Think about this for a moment. If they were wound into a ball, then they would tend towards keeping the original size.

Ideally the mass of string would need to be loose enough to follow the growth of the implant pocket, as the serous fluid continues to coax the pocket into larger sizes. The whole reason for the serous fluid production is that the string irritates the tissue. The PPP string doesn't \*absorb\*, it \*adsorbs\*. It doesn't take moisture and suddenly blossom into something ten times its original volume (unlike some toys we might be familiar with from our youth).

The PPP filament has been in use as a material for hernia repair for some 40-odd years, in particular for the implantation of a hernia mesh. Dr Johnson first noticed the accumulation of serous fluid in this context, hence his inspiration. We don't see hernia repairs which use PPP mesh suddenly blossoming with a patch which is ten times (or more) the size of the original patch, and for good reason.

To say that PPP implants are illegal would be somewhat incorrect, IMO. The material, as stated, can still be used in surgical procedures. However, if a surgeon is found to be using the material in this off-brand usage (ie, unapproved), he could risk losing his license. And surgeons tend towards wanting to keep their careers intact.

The only place I know that is doing PPP string implants is in Russia. But brace yourself for the price tag of \$150,000.

As for the upkeep, the implants themselves don't require any. However, in the event that the body's rate of serous fluid production in the implant pockets exceeds the body's ability to resorb, then either you see a surgeon or qualified doctor to drain off the excess fluid periodically, or you face the consequences of the growth. Excessive growth might be a novel fantasy for many, but the reality is that the skin can only stretch so thin, after which necrosis can develop. Or worse. This doesn't even take into account the other issues that the PPP string implants creates.
